
Library's community read events explore Charles Yu's bestselling novel "Interior Chinatown"

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Lawrence Public Library is thrilled to host Charles Yu, the author of the 2020 National Book Award winner, and our 2022 Read Across Lawrence selection "Interior Chinatown" Thursday, April 21st at 7pm on Zoom. Yu will be in conversation with Derek Kwan, Executive Director of the Lied Center of Kansas. They will discuss screenwriting, representation, and identity in Yu's playful but heartfelt latest work, "Interior Chinatown". Yu's most moving, daring, and masterful novel yet is a sendup of Hollywood tropes and Asian stereotypes—a deeply personal novel about race, pop culture, immigration, assimilation, and escaping the roles we are forced to play.
