Re: New Survey Shows West Virginians Oppose Status Quo for the Filibuster

Since Joe Biden's election back in November, elected officials have spent a great deal of time, energy, and media coverage debating filibuster reform. A new Global Strategy Group survey of 500 registered voters, however, shows this debate is limited to the halls of Congress: Very few West Virginians are currently tuned into the filibuster conversation, and contrary to conventional wisdom, this deeply red state is not anti-reform. These voters view the filibuster as a partisan weapon and oppose the status quo, and there's space to drive even more support for filibuster reform in West Virginia.

Key findings from the survey are below.1

Filibuster reform is not a top-tier issue in West Virginia

West Virginia voters don't particularly care about the filibuster. It's no secret that West Virginians have strong opinions, whether it's protecting miners or addressing the opioid crisis. But when it comes to the filibuster, few feel strongly: Only two thirds have an opinion and moderate voters – who will be key to any future electoral victories – are generally split on the filibuster (31% support reform/37% oppose reform, while 33 percent readily admit they don't know enough about the filibuster to even venture an opinion).

Further, less than one third of voters (28%) know Manchin has publicly spoken out against filibuster reform, underscoring just how removed West Virginians are from the issue.

To the extent they care, West Virginians back filibuster reform

West Virginians see the filibuster as a tool of gridlock, not bipartisanship. West Virginians may not know much or feel strongly about the filibuster, but they sense it is no longer serving its original purpose. When given even a simple neutral definition² of the filibuster, they say the filibuster is more likely to create gridlock on the issues they care about than it is to create bipartisan compromise.


¹Global Strategy Group conducted a phone survey of 500 registered voters in West Virginia between May 10 and 16, 2021. The survey had a margin of error of +/- 4.4%. Care has been taken to ensure the geographic and demographic divisions of the populations of voters are properly represented, and the data was weighted to the actual 2020 results statewide.

Messaging drives even further support for filibuster reform

A single message drives a plurality to support reforming the filibuster. Consistent with what we have seen on a national level,³ West Virginians are receptive to messaging: After West Virginians hear a single positive statement about filibuster reform, they move toward supporting filibuster reform (46% support/41% oppose).⁴


Specific proposals – especially those that highlight historic precedent – are even more popular. Even before they hear a statement in favor of reform, West Virginians back a variety of reform proposals. Talking about reform as restoring the filibuster to what it was historically is particularly powerful: Majorities of registered Democrats (61% support), Independents (53% support), Republicans (60% support), Biden voters (63% support), and Trump voters (58% support) all are supportive of "restoring the filibuster to what it was historically, with senators only being able to block an up or down vote if they are speaking on the floor." At 59% support and only 18% oppose, restoring the filibuster to what it once was is more than twice as popular as filibuster reform's main opponent, Mitch McConnell (25% favorable/56% unfavorable).



Highlighting how the filibuster currently works could drive even more opposition. West Virginia voters don't believe the filibuster should be allowed in a range of situations, from when the Senate needs to respond to an emergency such as the coronavirus pandemic (only 40% say the filibuster should be allowed in this situation) all the way to when the senator tries to block a vote by emailing their objection rather than coming to the Senate floor to speak (26% say should be allowed). Messaging that emphasizes the filibuster's wide-ranging power could drive even further support for reform, in West Virginia.



Senator Manchin has space to evolve on the filibuster

Republican arguments against reform lose out in West Virginia. When voters are presented with two arguments – one in favor of filibuster reform, arguing that it is a partisan weapon used to block real progress, and one against, arguing without the filibuster there would be less bipartisanship – the argument in favor wins out by nine points overall.



Voters want to see Senator Manchin do the right thing. Most voters are not only unaware of the Senator's current position, they also don't care if he changes his mind. They prioritize doing what's right for West Virginia regardless of what his position has been previously.

Supporting filibuster reform won't hurt Senator Manchin's standing. In a red state like West Virginia, it would be easy to erroneously assume supporting filibuster reform would hurt the Senator's future candidacy and legacy. But attacking Senator Manchin for supporting filibuster reform and DC statehood does not hurt Senator Manchin's standing with voters any more than the standard Republican attack he is likely to hear anyway. Roughly half of voters say they are less likely to vote for Senator Manchin after hearing an attack on him, regardless of whether the attack mentions that Senator Manchin "supports making Washington DC a state and abolishing the filibuster so Democrats can grab power and pass whatever legislation they want while ignoring the will of the people" (52% say they are less likely to vote for him when hearing this attack) or not (50% less likely to vote for him).

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²Appendix: Simple filibuster definition language

As you may know, the filibuster allows senators to prevent the U-S Senate from voting on proposed legislation. It takes 60 of the Senate's 100 senators to end a filibuster, which means bills can be blocked even if a majority of senators support voting on them

⁴Appendix: Positive filibuster message
